



## History of Trophy Club MUD

### The Early Days

Before there was a town, the area now known as Trophy Club was originally designed to have five Multiple Utility Districts (MUDs). MUD 1, today's Trophy Club MUD, was the original MUD and was formed in 1975.



In the early 1980s, MUDs 2 and 3 were formed as development began to occur in those areas. MUD 2 was originally the area west of the creek that crosses under Trophy Club Drive near Tom Thumb. This included the area known as "Village West" near Lakeview Elementary School and the Church at Trophy Lakes. MUD 3 was the area on the east side of town, between Timberline and Harmony Park.

### Building the Community

In 1982, the partnership that was building the area now known as Solana, which is located in Westlake, approached MUD 1 to request water, sewer and fire protection as MUD 1 had all three capabilities already in place. With an agreement from Westlake, Solana was annexed into MUD 1 in 1983.



In 1984, the MUDs built the first municipal building at the 100 Municipal Drive complex. In 1985, a fire station was built at Trophy Club and Municipal Drive to house equipment and provide storage for the Fire Department.



## Reorganization

In 1985, the Town of Trophy Club was incorporated, and in July of 1990, MUDs 2 and 3 consolidated into what was then known as MUD 2. Subsequently, there was an agreement that all remaining land would become part of MUD 2 rather than creating new MUDs. It was recognized that while MUD taxing districts could be separate, the water, sewer lines, plants and fire department were facilities of the community as a whole and should be operated as such. In October 2000, the Trophy Club Master District Joint Venture was formed for the purpose of overseeing and running the operations, providing input for both MUD 1 and MUD 2.



## The New Trophy Club MUD No.1

In 2009, the residents voted to combine the MUD 1 and MUD 2, resulting in the current Trophy Club MUD 1. A publicly elected five-member board governs the Trophy Club MUD 1. District Manager Jennifer McKnight manages the day-to-day operations.

Directors of Trophy Club MUD have all pledged to follow the Trophy Club MUD code of ethics to ensure the highest level of service to all customers of the District, residents of Trophy Club and the public.
